California Classic 2017

After almost a year of planning and weeks of obsessively watching the weather forecast, I'm happy to report that the California Classic 2017 at Murieta Equestrian Center was a great success. A total of 87 horses showed, up from 57 in 2016, so it seems that word has spread that this is a show worth coming to. We were especially pleased with the number of youth exhibitors who participated this year.

California Classic 2016, the first "pointed show" that Area VII did since 2011, was a very good start. 57 horses showed and the exhibitors, volunteers, and MEC management were all pretty happy with the way things went. That show was entirely run by volunteers from our club, ably and enthusiastically led by Gail Byrnes, who left us to move to New Hampshire shortly after the show.

When the Show Committee met to start planning for 2017, the first thing we decided was that we needed to hire a professional show manager, even though it would increase the show budget by a not insubstantial amount. It was one of the best decisions we could have made. We also solicited feedback from the exhibitors and acted on several suggestions, including rearranging the schedule so it was more balanced, and adding more driving classes.

We also presented two awards this year that we intend to present annually at the California Classic going forward.

The "Sierra's Dances With Gold" Youth Spirit Award was sponsored by Ravenstar Farm in honor of their stallion. This award will be given each year to a youth "who demonstrates a cheerfully cooperative and kind personality. They must be helpful to family, friends, and/or other competitors. We'd like to see them grooming, bathing, exercising, loading and unloading their vehicle, or performing other helpful tasks. This youth should be bonded with their horse as shown through patience and kindness toward the horse. Lots of pets, hugs, and kisses are good, too!" This year's award was presented to Katie Radulovich. Katie received an award certificate and a \$25 Ozark Mountain gift certificate.



Hi everyone!

This Spring has been busy for us. We enjoyed working at the California Classic and also participating with Cooper. He needs a lot of practice and some time to mature before he will be a good show horse. But we had a great time—visited with old friends, met some new ones, and ate yummy food! We are looking forward to next year!



Last weekend we helped Angels For Minis with a wonderful schooling show in Walnut Creek. I love their schooling shows as the people are so enthusiastic to learn new things. Many have never seen these disciplines before and it is enjoyable to

teach them and then watch their success. Mary Stewart has dedicated herself to rescuing miniature horses who need to be re-homed. Many of these rescues are in very poor condition. She uses her resources to nurture them back to good health including vet care, hoof trimming, nutrition, and companionship with people and other horses. Then they are carefully adopted to forever homes. We have a beautiful mare we adopted from Mary. She couldn't be more healthy or more fun.

We will have another show in Walnut Creek on Saturday, July 8th. We invite you all to come! All proceeds go to this worthy cause.

In April, we were blessed with a beautiful new colt. We are very excited about him. His dam is Raven Stars Elegant Dream Dance and his sire is Sierra's Phoenix Great Expectations. His is a tri-colored pintoloosa with a dorsal stripe. He is very upright and refined and he also moves well. This is our first multicolored foal and he got it all! In his markings he has a pair of wings laying on his back. So we named him RSF Great Dreams of Pegasus. We'll call him Pegasus. You might see him in the show ring next year!

Lastly, we are asking if anyone has information about where we can find a grant writer. The person we seek must be able to write grants but also have sources that might help fund a grant. We are also searching for someone who might have between two and five acres they would donate or sell inexpensively. This project would be a non-profit center where children can come and learn about California Agriculture. California grows food that feeds much of our nation and other places in the world. Agriculture as a career is all but lost and we feel this is a way to remind young people how important it is.

The grant would cover the start up costs. To begin with, children of preschool and elementary school ages would have the opportunity to interact with miniature animals, plant something they can take home and grow, do a farm related art project, and participate in other "hands on" kinds of science experiments. Eventually there will be an outreach program where we would go to their classrooms and also a community factor. We will live on site and this will be our retirement project. We really believe in this and would appreciate any information you are willing to share. Thanks all!

Double E Ranch News

This year we have opted to scale back on our training, showing, and breeding in order to focus on downsizing our current herd. Indeed, we plan to breed only a limited number of mares to our national halter and pleasure driving stallion, Mountain Meadows Simply Sensational ("Sensa"). At this time, we have one mare, Grahams Sunswept Destiny, in foal to Sensa. The cross is widely anticipated, as Destiny is a paternal sister to Grahams Ragtime.

This foal season has seen some of the most eagerly-awaited crosses from our national and world champion stallions. Marystown McDreamy (Mac) sired a gorgeous colt out of a Mountain Meadows mare. Paul and Ailene Tarap, who own Mac, also recently purchased his son whom they affectionally call "Steamy McDreamy."

Last year, we purchased three mares from Nancy Rivenburgh, whom we refer to as "The Rivenburgh Dames. One of them, Prada, was in foal to her famous Jesse James stallion. This cross resulted in a stunning chestnut pinto colt that we have named "Striker" due to the lighting bolt strip on his face. The third foal we were expecting has surpassed our wildest dreams. EE Miraculous Bi Design was born in March, the first miniature horse born via frozen straws of semen from a deceased stallion. Milagra ("miracle" in Spanish) is a truly special filly that we now co-own with the Blantons with whom we shared a partnership of her sire, Design. We are offering his straws and stud fee for a reasonable price. Please PM Jacob Elliott for details.

Finally, we have been blessed with three colts from our AMHA world champion futurity stallion, Hunterberry Hill Impressive Design ("Hunter"). It's a colt year

Wesco Farms Ranch News

[Editor's Note: Michelle sent this ranch news for the spring issue, which was cancelled, so I've chosen to include it in this issue.—MN]

We're fortunate here NOT to be completely flat, so flooding is at a minimum. Muddy as @!#!, but no standing water. Damage has been minimal too. We lost one shelter, so two of the boys are housed in the good ol' "tarp hut" (cattle panels with tarps)—not pretty but they're out of the weather when they want to be while we get repairs completed. Otherwise we're being a bit more intensive on herd management with all the lush grass. 63 acres of grassy hills and fewer than 40 Minis isn't a great mix in the spring. So we're limiting "hill" time for the first time since we've been here.

We have two definite pregnant mares, and a few maybes. Pulling Topper out after a week, I'm surprised any were covered, but a good health scare made breeding seem like a bad idea last spring. A bummer now, but a great idea at the time!

Hoping to get a couple more boys gelded this year (any gelding clinics?), just wrapping the brain around what it costs to geld any more with a not so great gelding market. Is that an age thing? Sigh...

A couple of horses are leaving and one is coming back. Duck (Wesco Farms Ozs Luck of the Draw) is going to his new mom. He seems to be great fit for Liz. Barn Lessons

We horse people are a curious lot. Joy is found in mundane chores. Every season brings its peculiar challenges of mucking out stalls, feeding, cleaning water buckets, polishing tack, grooming, and working with our animals. We complain about the weather, but never resent time spent at the stable, whatever the temperature.

Barn visits are safe harbors, vivifying time away from family and work, solely for us. Our relationship to horses is existential, providing continual opportunities for learning more deeply about ourselves. We train to be better equestrians, while aspiring to become the person we want to be.

Progress in the training arena is slow. Putting in daily time and effort is required; inconsistency is frustrating for humans and equines alike. Setbacks are constant. Coaching refines and refreshes intentionality. Moments we are in sync, while fleeting, are fulfilling and affirming. A good drive with my pony sustains me for days.

Fear is a curious companion for all, from the new lesson kid to the most experienced adult. We think we are in control of these noble creatures, but at any surprise, survival instinct can spook the most refined genetics and conditioned behavior, resulting in crow-stepping, rearing, bucking, and bolting.

All of us struggle with anxiety after an accidental fall. And the longer it festers, the more debilitating. It took weeks for me to settle back into the cart after a driving incident. The pony was fine; I was skittish. With support from barn mates and my trainer, I went back to the basics and began again—becoming a better driver.

Improvement is always needed. Coaches ask, “What do you want to work on?” then break down success into minute calibrations of achievable results. Giving one quarter inch more of rein relaxes and straightens out my animal. Small postural adjustments for me also have seismic positive consequences.

I have been at the same barn for seven years, long enough to watch lesson kids become confident teens, and the older kids graduate college, all the while deepening connections to the adult boarders. Our successes and frustrations here inform relationships with family, friends, and colleagues.

Showing up and being fully present is equally beneficial at work and at home. Goal setting and overcoming fear is important. Patience and persistence pays off. Seeking advice and recalibration essential. Nurturing and challenging ourselves throughout life, we need to begin again and again to thrive.
